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# Reorganization to Sustain Drexel as a Top Research University

Drexel's recent attainment of coveted R1 research status in the Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education puts this University in a strong position, and having reached a ranking for the highest research activity - one that is held by just 37 private universities - we want to make sure we maintain this distinction and achieve even more. Effective immediately, the Office of Corporate Relations and Economic Development will be renamed **Drexel Applied Innovation**, and report to the Provost's Office under the direction of <u>Aleister J. Saunders, Ph.D.</u>, whose title will change to Executive Vice Provost for Research and Innovation. Drexel Ventures and the Office of Technology Commercialization will be part of Drexel Applied Innovation. ## Fiscal Year 2020 Approved Fringe Benefit Rates for Sponsored Projects

Drexel University has finalized the negotiations of the fiscal year 2020 fringe benefits rates for sponsored projects with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS). The finalized rates are for full-time employees have decreased from 31.9% to 31.7% from the proposed rate. Part-time and DUCOM Highly Compensated Faculty rates remain the same as the proposed rates. Coeus and Banner have both been updated to reflect the new rates effective July 1, 2019. For fiscal year 2020, the Academy of Natural Sciences (ANS) will revert to using their non-sponsored fringe benefit rates. Proposal submissions for ANS should utilize these rates for any salary and wages after July 1, 2019. Coeus and Banner have also been updated to reflect this change. <u>Read more</u>.

The U.S. - Egypt Science & Technology Joint Fund Cycle 20 request for Collaborative Research and Junior Scientist Development Visit Grant proposals is now open. Collaborative Research Grants foster research collaboration between Egyptian and U.S. scientists, with up to \$200,000 USD available for each country's research team. Junior Scientist Development Visit Grants provide up to \$30,000 USD for short-term research training visits for Egyptian researchers to go to U.S. institutions. **The deadline to apply is September 5, 2019 at 11:59 Cairo, Egypt time**. Applications will be accepted in the areas of energy, health, water, agriculture, and machine learning/artificial intelligence applications. Researchers from U.S. and Egyptian scientific institutes, universities, research centers, and governmental agencies are eligible to apply. #### Breaches of Peer Review Integrity

The National Institutes of Health (NIH) defines a breach of review integrity as any violation of a core value of NIH peer review. It is their priority to engage with the community about what constitutes a breach of NIH peer review integrity – including, but not limited to: a reviewer sending grant applications to their postdocs to write their critiques; someone revealing that they reviewed a particular application; a reviewer disclosing how another reviewer scored an application; a principal investigator (PI) approaching a reviewer at a scientific conference to discuss her/his institution's application in which s/he is designated as PI. Yes, each of these constitutes a breach of NIH peer review integrity. Potential consequences of breaches of review integrity include terminating the review or Council member's service in peer review, pursuing a referral for suspension or debarment, or other possibilities that could result in criminal penalties. <u>Read</u> <u>more</u>.

#### Update from NSTC Joint Committee on Research Environments

On July 9, 2019, the National Science and Technology Council (NSTC), with management guidance from the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP), hosted a meeting of the NSTC Joint Committee on the Research Environment (or NSTC J-CORE). Led by senior government officials who chair the NSTC Committee on Science and the NSTC Committee on the S&T Enterprise, J-CORE is composed of four independent sub-committees each tackling a key issue critical to the future health and well-being of the American R&D ecosystem: the Subcommittee on Safe and Inclusive Research Environments; the Subcommittee on Rigor and Integrity in Research; the Subcommittee on Research Security; the Subcommittee on Reducing Administrative Burdens. Dr. Cordova asks for your input and support so that we can work with the NSF to develop solutions that are needed to promote the progress of science, to advance the national health, prosperity, and welfare, and to secure the national defense, even if it means making changes to long-standing policies and practices.

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FAQs Posted for "Responsibilities of Recipient
Institutions in Communicating Misconduct to the NIH"
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In October of 2018, the NIH published <u>NOT-OD-19-020</u>, or "Responsibilities of Recipient Institutions in Communicating Misconduct to the NIH," which detailed efforts partner institutions must take to maintain the integrity of NIH-funded research. On July 23, 2019, NIH published additional <u>FAQs</u> to provide guidance for recipient institutions.

#### Understanding NIH/AHRQ Resubmission Rules

Submitting an application can be stressful. Re-submitting an application can be downright confusing. The NIH and AHRQ have published and revised specific rules around resubmission applications. To help alleviate confusion, they offer the following "basics" of the resubmission rules:

- Only a single <u>resubmission (A1)</u> of a competing <u>new</u>, <u>revision</u> or <u>renewal</u> application (<u>A0</u>) will be accepted.
- Following an unsuccessful *resubmission* (A1) application, applicants may submit the same idea as a *new* (A0) application for the next appropriate *new* application due date (see <u>NOT-OD-18-197</u> for exceptions).
- Resubmissions (A1s) must be submitted within 37 months of the last competing *new*, *revision*, or*renewal* (A0) application.
